"The staff were nice. I felt welcomed and was treated like a human. The BRIDGES program surprised me that it existed and was available to me and that it helps with building independence." – S, age 18


What is one thing you've learned here that will help you in the future? "Not every adult is like my parents. Some people do care." – D, age 17

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




We provide individualized care to every child.

We provide safety and an opportunity to thrive. Your partnership allows us to continue our mission of caring for children experiencing abuse, neglect, human trafficking, grief, and homelessness in our community. Our programs are designed to help youth heal from the trauma they have experienced through individualized care.

91% of all dollars go directly toward these programs.



Last year, the Wichita Children's Home provided services to children across

36 counties in Kansas and a safe place with comprehensive care for

1,838 youth.



Anti-Human Trafficking



WCH offers comprehensive care for human trafficking victims through three programs. Dakhil Safe Home provides stabilization for youth under 17, the Garver Program offers long-term care, and our transitional living programs help survivors gain independence. Services also include outreach, trauma-informed counseling, and after-care for ongoing support.

Last year, the Wichita Children's Home helped 61 victims of human trafficking begin the complex healing process through trauma-informed services and a victim-centered approach.

Kidzcope

1 in 12 children in Kansas will experience the death of a parent or sibling by age 18.

Kidzcope extends no-fee, peer-based bereavement services to the community's children (ages 3-18) and their caregivers, facilitated by our dedicated team of trained staff and volunteers. Through expressive art and other therapeutic activities, we help children understand the depth of their grief, express their feelings, nurture healing, honor memories, and find personal empowerment as they navigate the changes resulting from the death, loss, or separation of a loved one.

We are thrilled to introduce our newest team member, Valoo, our specially trained facility dog! He's already doing a great job at WCH. As a puppy, he lived with a foster family in San Diego and did his service dog training at Richard J. Donovan prison. His WCH handler spent 10 days in California, forging a bond with him and learning what he could do.

CrossRoads

Each day a youth goes without stable housing increases the likelihood of them facing homelessness as adults. CrossRoads Emergency Shelter and Drop-In Center provides essential services and resources for youth in crisis, who are experiencing homelessness, have runaway, or are at risk of trafficking and exploitation. We inspire these young individuals to believe in their potential and the possibility of a more positive path forward.



Youth Anti-Homeless Programs

Gerard House & MOM

Gerard House, Kansas's only residential maternity group home for foster youth facing homelessness, offers a safe and supportive start for pregnant and parenting teens aged 10-21 and their babies. It provides residential care, pre-and post-natal support, parenting education, life skills training, and on-site daycare, helping ensure healthy pregnancies and strong parental bonds.

The Moving Onto Motherhood (MOM) program supports and empowers youth (ages 10-21) on their journey into motherhood. The program enhances young mothers well-being through case management, parenting education, life skills classes, and referrals. Our Baby Mobile, stocked with essentials like diapers and car seats, visits schools and community centers to immediately assist pregnant and parenting youth.



Last year, you helped 130 teen mothers and babies across our programs.
