Jackson came to the Wichita Children's Home because of a crisis in the family that escalated and created an unsafe environment for him at home. Just seven years old and hearing impaired, he was scared and unfamiliar with his new surroundings. Because of the many donations of masks we received, we were able to provide our staff with clear masks so Jackson could still read their lips and see their facial expressions. He soon became close with the staff and began to feel safe.


